# In Commemoration of the 500th ANNIVERSARY OF THE REFORMATION 1517-2017

On October 31, 1517, a young Augustinian monk named Martin Luther, nailed 95 theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. His purpose was to challenge abuses in church doctrine and practice. Although intended only for public debate among fellow religious and professors, the 95 theses were published and soon spread like wildfire throughout the German territories and beyond. Luther's writings served as a catalyst for a movement that claimed many church leaders, including John Calvin.

Reformation 500 Holland's commemoration of this epochal event in the history of the church—indeed of the entire world—has had a dual thrust. First, the Reformation left an indelible stamp on this city. The churches and schools, the customs and ways of life here, cannot be understood apart from the Dutch Calvinism that has shaped them. Reformation 500 has provided Holland citizens a special occasion to remember and honor their spiritual and cultural heritage. Second, the Reformation did not only concern Luther and Protestants, but also the entire Western church. That is why our committee includes both Protestants and Catholics. Together we sought ways to explore our common past, not merely to satisfy the historical curiosity of Holland citizens, but to encourage the members of local congregations and parishes to learn from the divisions that happened then. Having looked into our past, we as the church can ask who we are today, with a view to how we can move forward together into a shared future.

In this perspective, Reformation 500 Holland has sought to be a catalyst for Christian unity. For this reason, there is a no more fitting finale to our commemoration than this ecumenical worship service, in which Protestants and Catholics praise God together! May it be a sign of good things to come!



#### Nicene Creed


# **Closing Prayer/Benediction**
