A gathering of Christians Uniting in Song and Prayer [CUSP] *Christians Uniting in Song and Prayer (CUSP)* is successor to the team that organized and presented five events in October, 2017, commemorating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. CUSP is best described by its mission statement:

In the crucified and risen Christ we are reconciled to God and to one another. This is at the heart of the Christian message to which the Church is called to give witness in the world. Deep and painful divisions among its members today, however, obscure this message and therefore compromise its witness.

Out of a shared commitment to overcome these divisions, CUSP was formed. Located in the Holland community, we are a fellowship of Protestants and Catholics convinced that Christians joining in public assembly to sing and pray together can help to restore and promote our unity. Our conviction is rooted in the acknowledgment that Christian unity is both gift and task. In celebrating together our common faith, we recover a vision of the inestimable gift that God has granted to us in Christ. Renewed thereby in our appreciation of this gift, we go out energized to take up the difficult task of reconciling with fellow Christians whose differences keep us separated.

In response Christians come together to pray for the unity of the Church. Congregations and parishes all over the world exchange preachers or arrange special ecumenical celebrations and prayer services. The occasion for this special experience is the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

The traditional period in the northern hemisphere for the Week of Prayer is January 18 to 25. Those dates were proposed in 1908 by Paul Wattson because they coincide with the feasts of the Chair of St. Peter and the Conversion of St. Paul, which he considered to have symbolic significance for Christian unity. In the southern hemisphere churches have chosen other periods to celebrate the Week of Prayer, often around Pentecost, which is also a symbolic date for the unity of the Church.

Continuing the tradition, the World Council of Churches and the Roman Catholic Church have been inviting their ecumenical partners to provide liturgical texts based on a biblical theme to guide the Week of Prayer since 1968. For 2023 they chose a group of Christians from the Minnesota Council of Churches of the United States of America (USA) for this task.

Minnesota has been the site of some of the most egregious racial atrocities in the United States. In 1862, it witnessed the largest mass execution in the nation's history, when 38 members of the Dakota Indigenous people were hanged in Mankato, the day after Christmas. As they were led to the gallows, they sang the hymn *Wakantanka taku nitawa* ("Many and Great, O God, are your works, maker of earth and sky").

More recently, Minnesota became the epicenter of racial reckoning, when in May 2020, only a few months after the Covid-19 outbreak, a black man, George Floyd, Jr., was murdered at the hands of a white police officer named Derek Chauvin in Minneapolis. The grisly scene was captured on a cell phone camera by 17-year-old high school student Darnelle Frazier, who uploaded the video to Facebook. The post went viral, causing mass demonstrations to erupt in streets throughout the world in outrage at the act of violence against Floyd by Chauvin and fellow police officers, who stood by and watched passively. Chauvin, who was dismissed immediately after the attack, would become the first police officer in modern history convicted for murdering a black man.


Racially-motivated violence has been a tragic theme in American history. In recent times, more and more citizens have expressed shared concern about this longstanding problem, which threatens the political unity and stability of this nation. The problem has not spared the churches, which increasingly acknowledge racial issues as a regrettable source of their historical divisions. Given these realities, prayer for Christian unity, especially during the Week of Prayer for Christian unity, is certainly relevant in the American context.

The Minnesota Council of Churches, composed of a diverse group of clergy and lay leaders inclusive of Indigenous and African American peoples, have been actively engaged in these issues. Consequently, they have chosen as this year's theme "Do Good; seek justice," a command that God gives to the covenant people through the prophet Isaiah (Isa. 1:17). It is a theme that certainly applies to the struggle for Christian unity against racial injustice.

Our service is celebrated in solidarity with our fellow Christians in Minnesota. At the same time, we have adapted the liturgy to express the realities in our own context here in Holland. May God's Spirit unite our hearts as we worship God together!
